The program uses an inclusive and locally-led process that strengthens local capacity, facilitates partnerships and creates a path forward to achieve community-identified goals. The program will provide planning assistance to local governments partnering with community organizations to reduce the effects of heat islands in overburdened communities. Selected local governments will work with neighborhood residents alongside federal and state agency partners and consultants to participate in a planning process that helps identify the community's vision, goals and actions to: Incorporate smart growth principles; Increase green space and improve infrastructure to reduce the heat island effect; And, improve livability. This round will also include a pilot youth engagement module that will supplement the assistance for up to three (3) communities. Youth are a key part of all communities but are often left out of meaningful planning discussions. Engaging youth in city planning can help address intergenerational equity and ensure that the needs of future generations is prioritized. To support youth engagement, the Building Blocks program will engage local secondary and/or higher education partners in the process. Each partner organization will work with EPA to develop an engagement opportunity to ensure that young people have a voice in shaping, and take a leadership role on implementing, the resulting action plan. TAG funding can also be used to encourage public participation by working with TA to increase the community's knowledge about site remedies and the cleanup process. Ultimately, the goal of TAG is to help communities be active participants and leaders in the investigation and cleanup of contaminated properties located in their communities. Through grants to regionally-based partners and collaborators, CAL FIRE seeks to significantly increase fuels management, fire reintroduction, treatment of degraded areas, and forest health of forests. Forest Health projects must focus on large, landscape-scale forestlands composed of one or more landowners, which may cover multiple jurisdictions. Large landscapes will usually include watersheds, freshweds, or larger logical management units. The total project area should amount to be no less than 800 acres in size; landscape units do not have to be contiguous.
